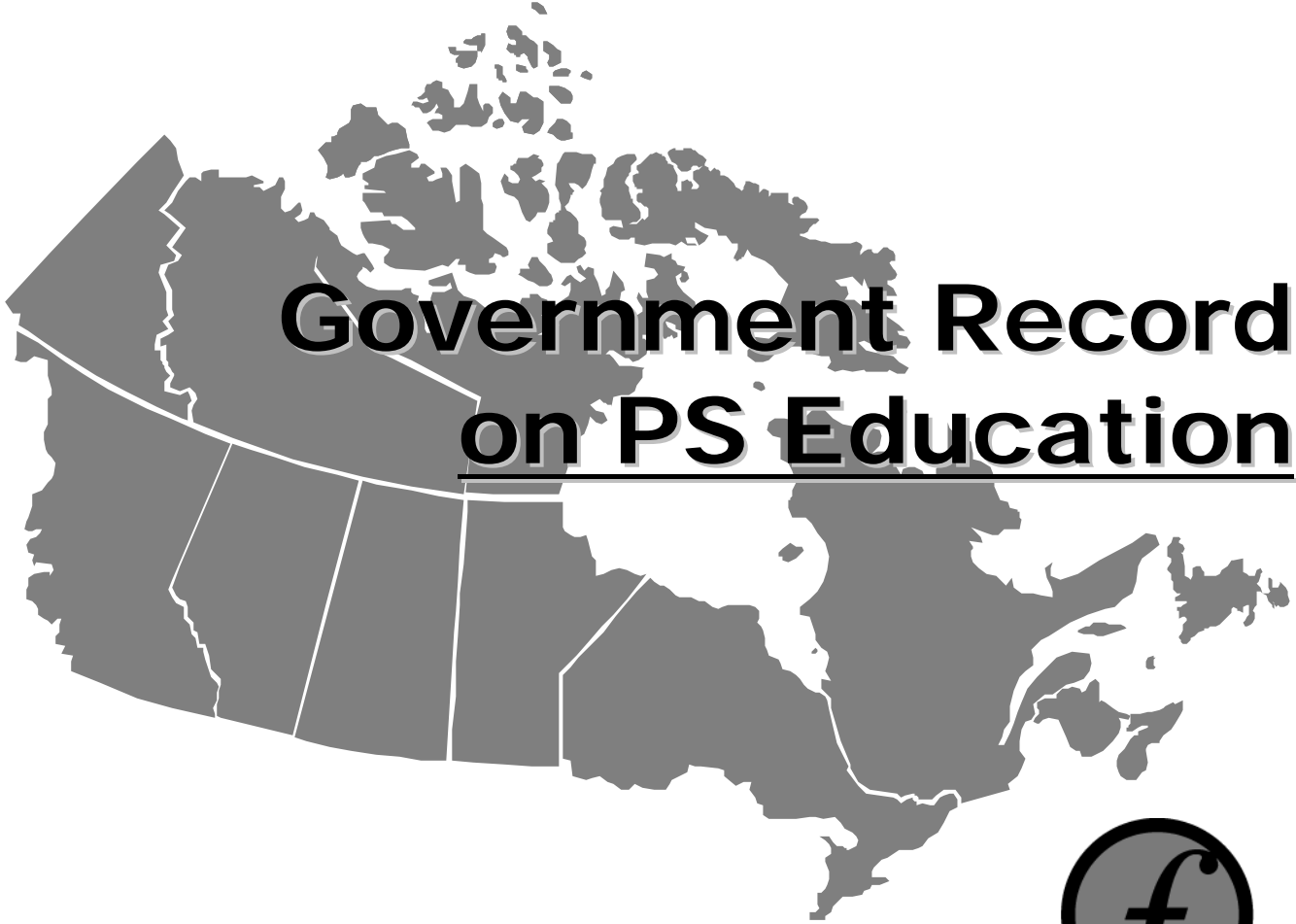

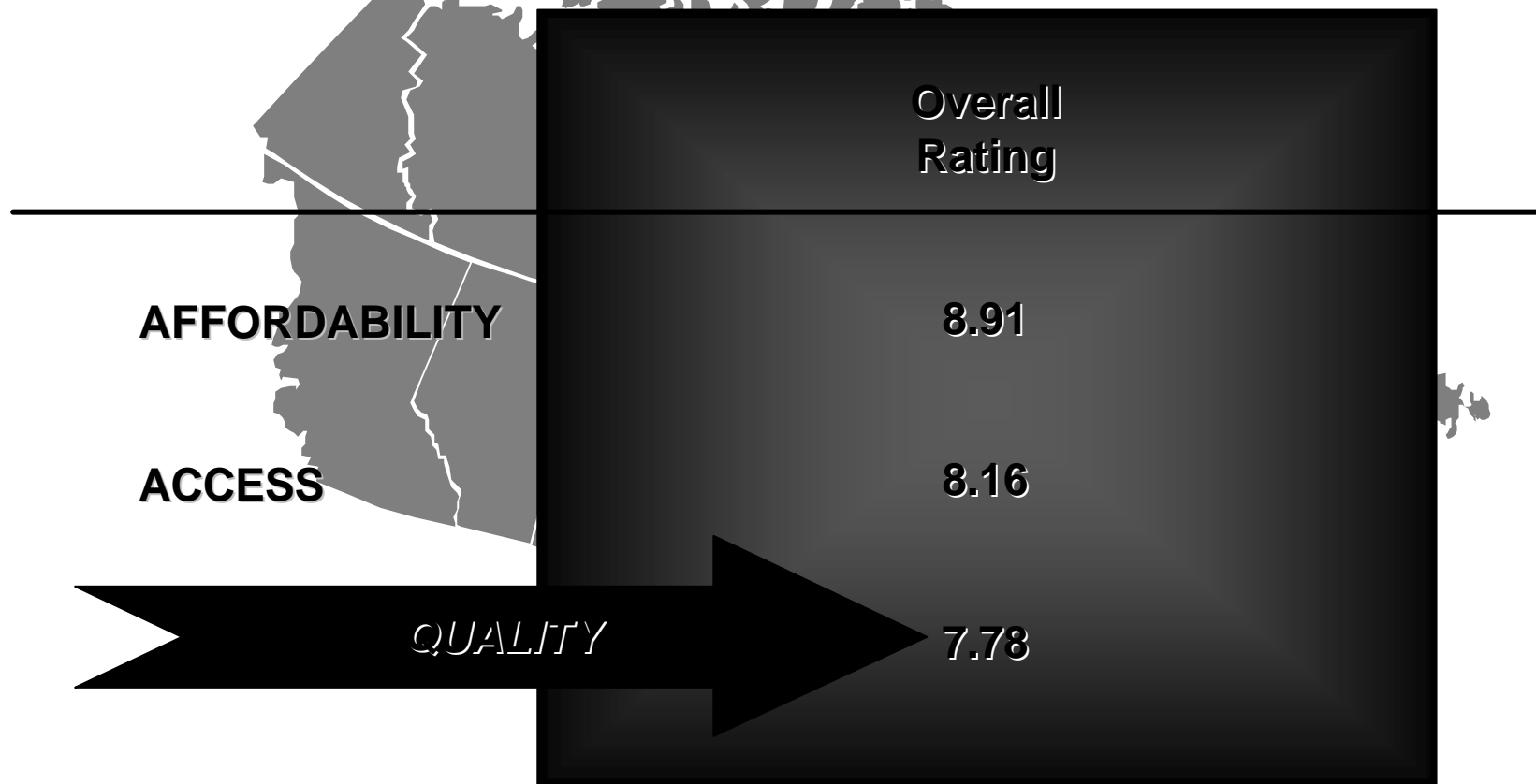

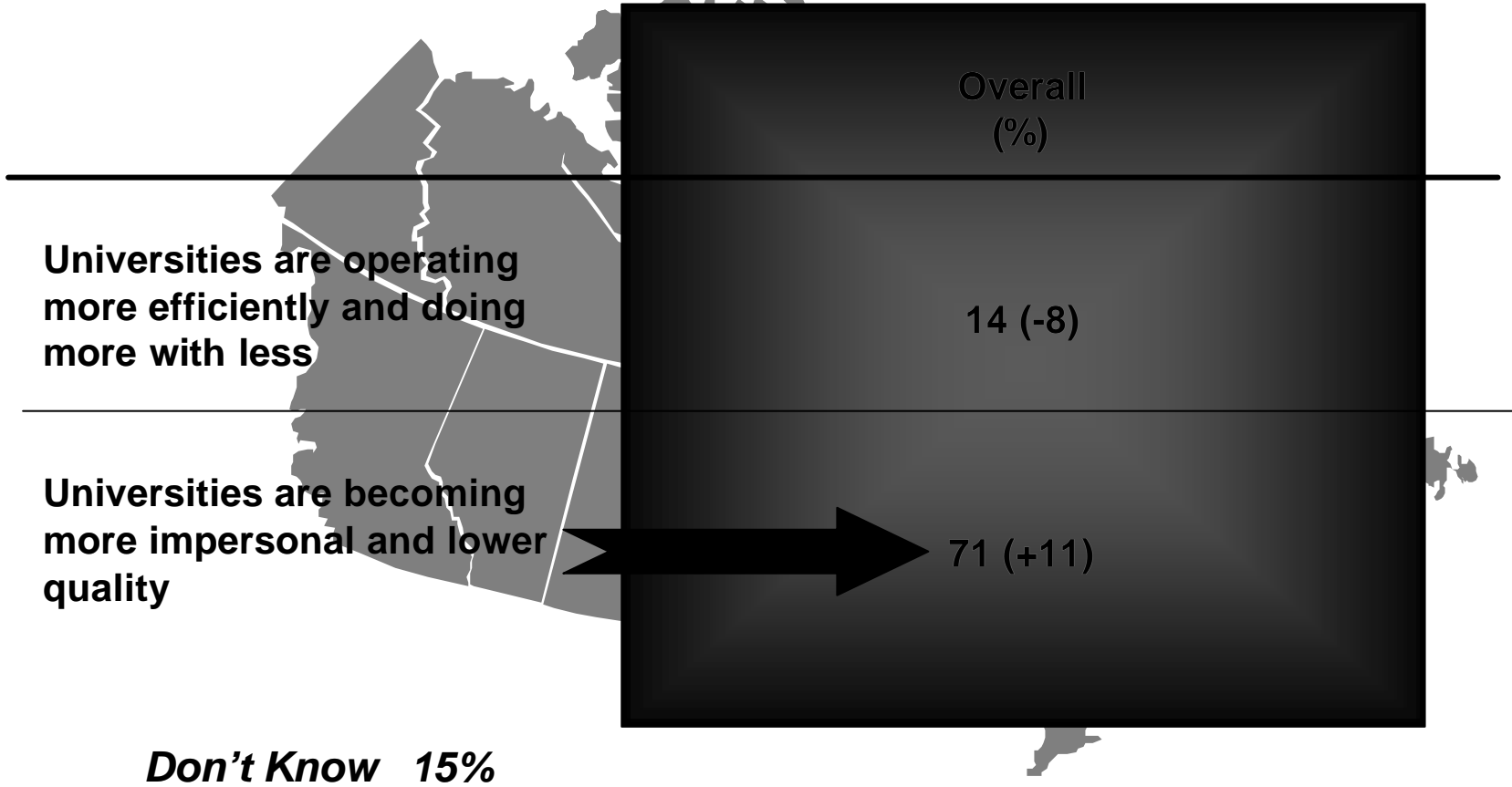

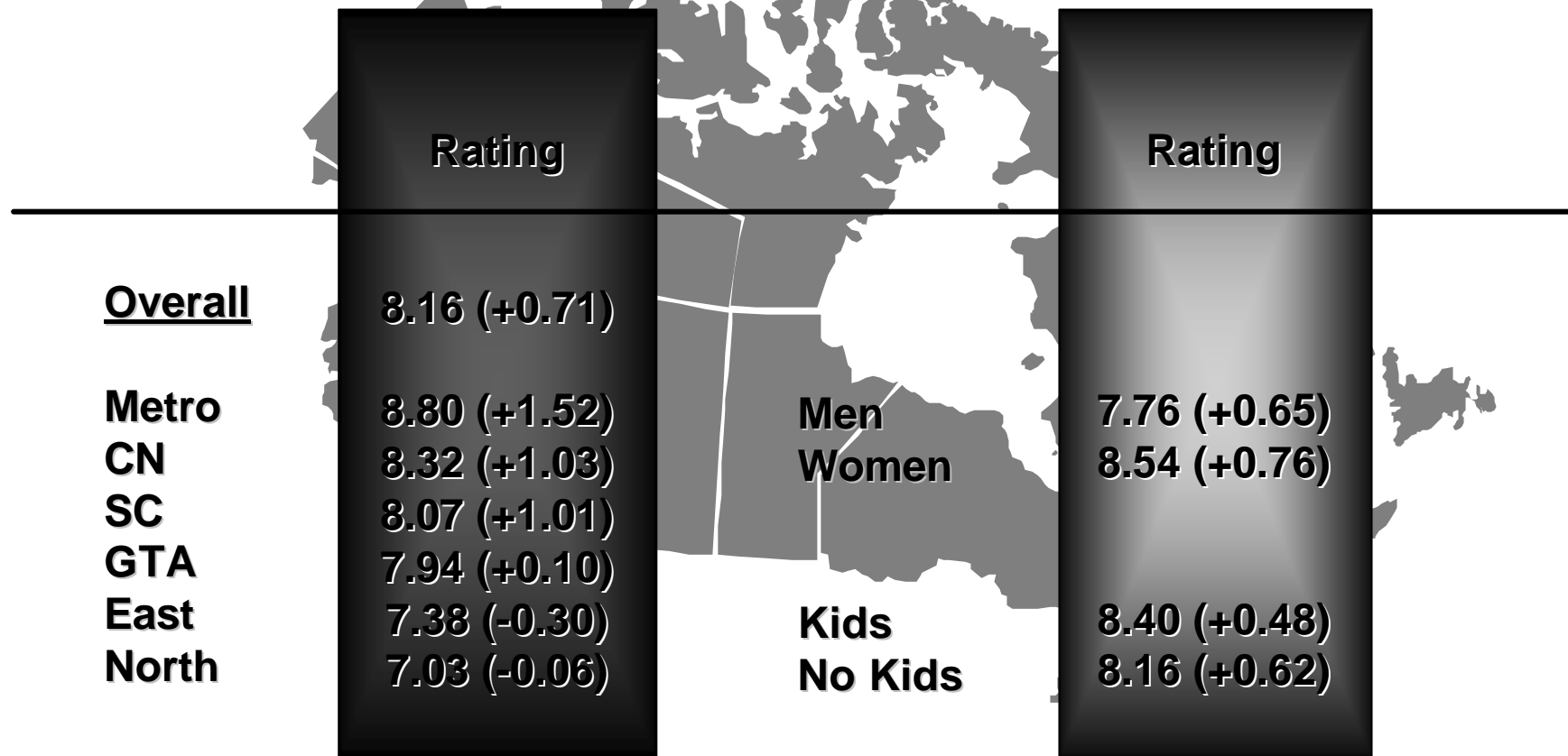
# Major Axes of Investigation - Focus: OPPORTUNITY

*Q. RE: post-secondary education in Ontario using a scale where 1 is “not at all concerned” and 10 is “very concerned,” how concerned are you with...*



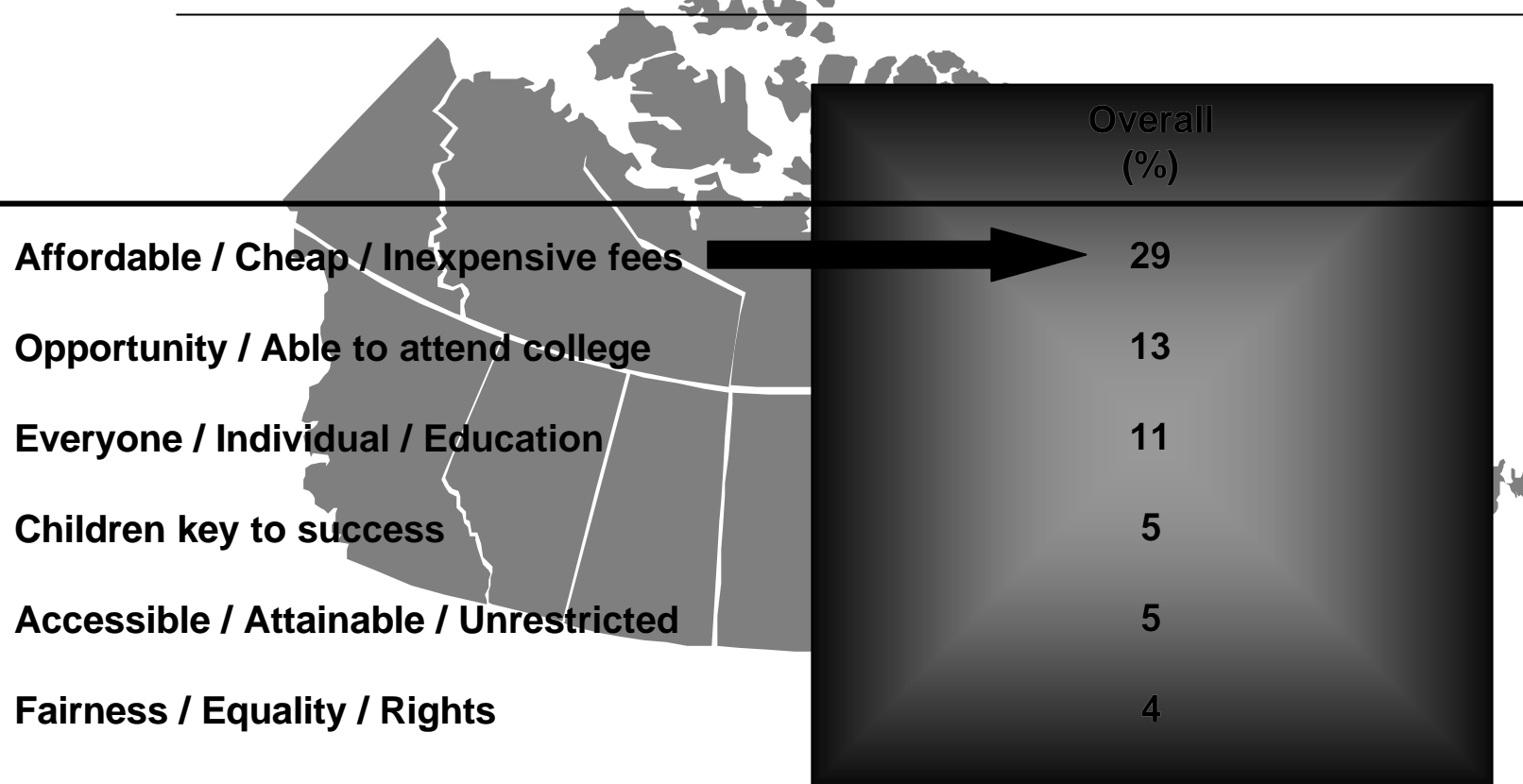
# Access to PS Education: Level of Concern

*Q. Using a scale where 1 is “not at all concerned” and 10 is “very concerned,” how concerned are you with access to post-secondary education in Ontario?*



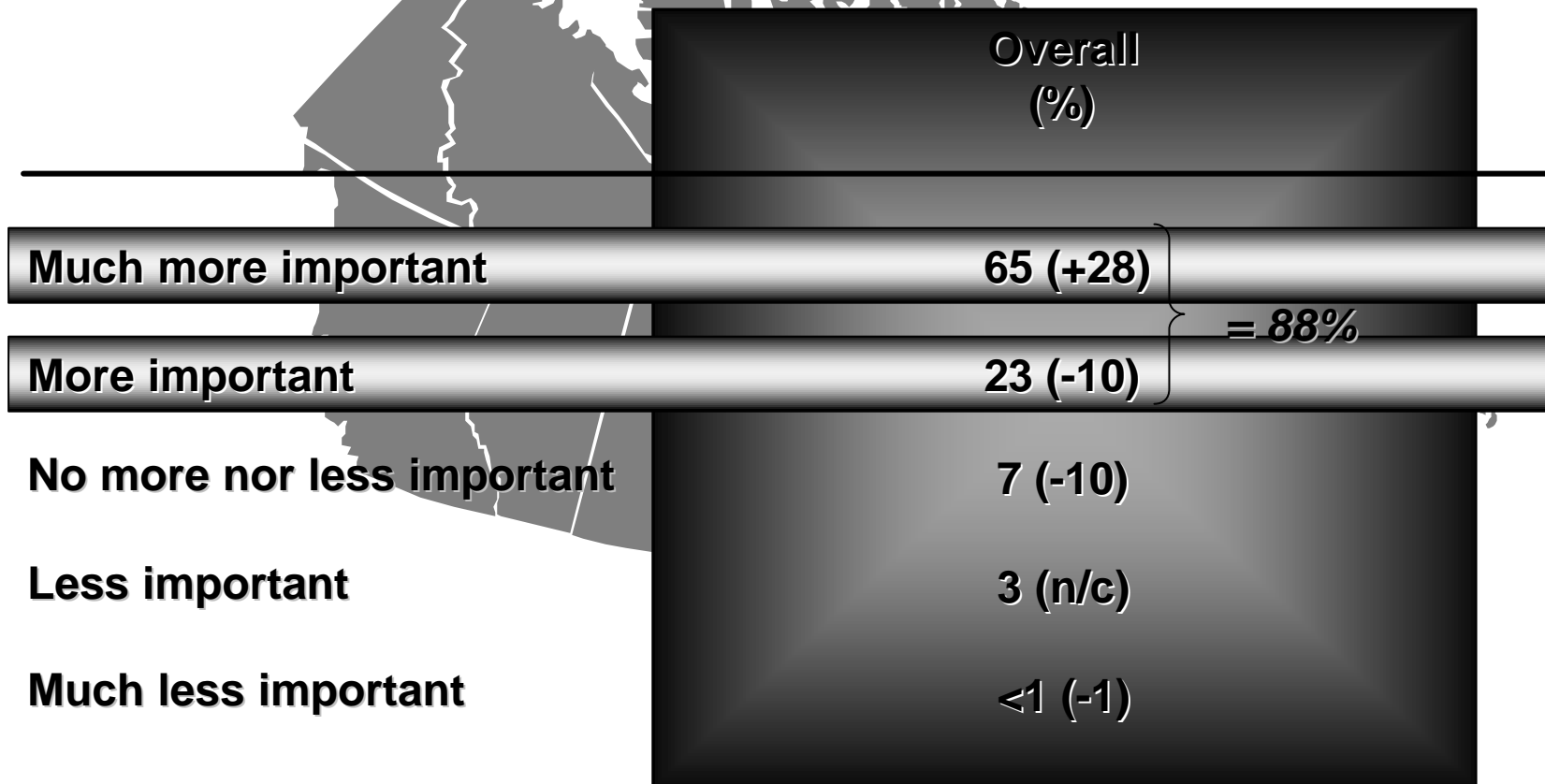
# "Access" to PS Education: Public Perception

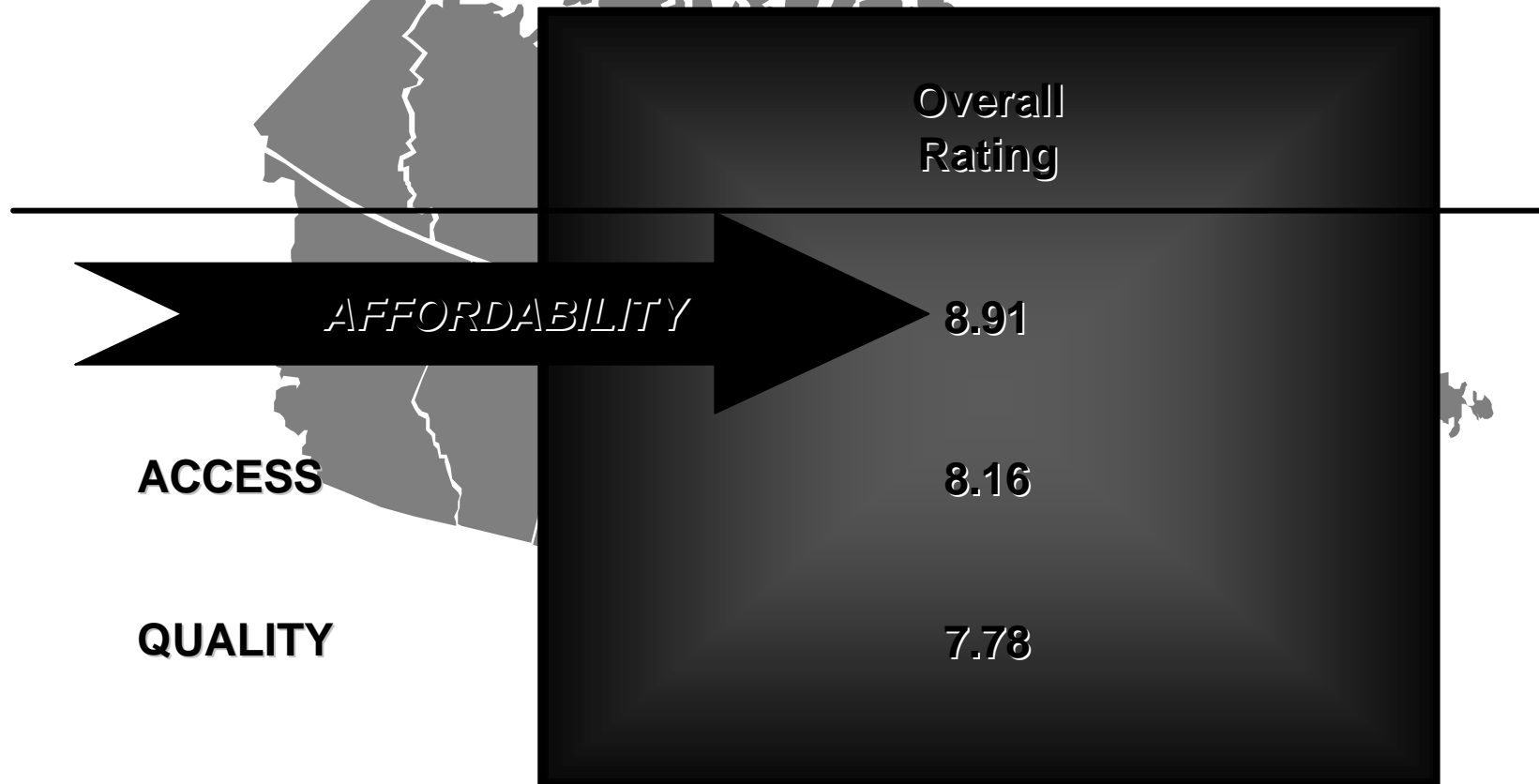

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

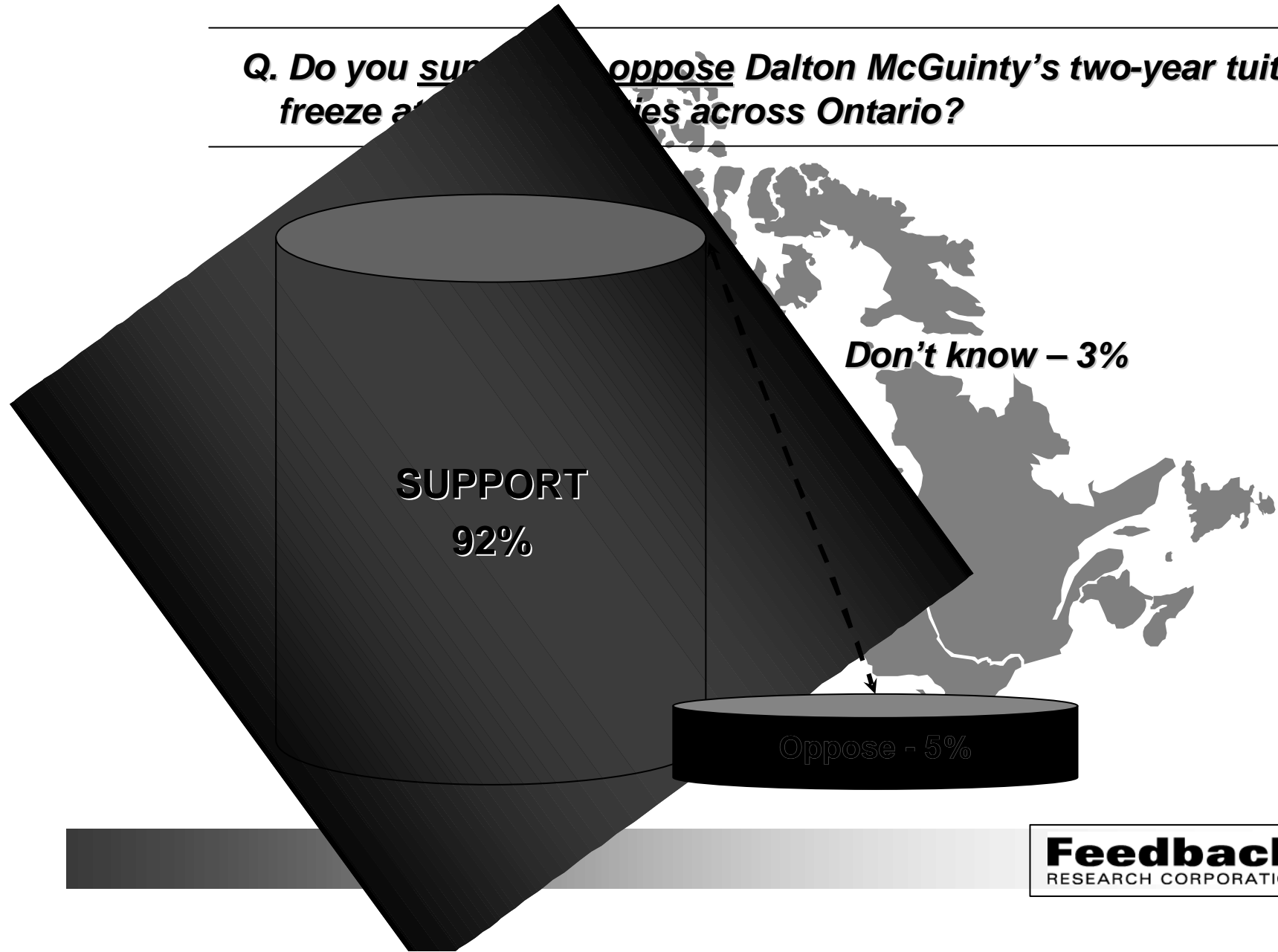

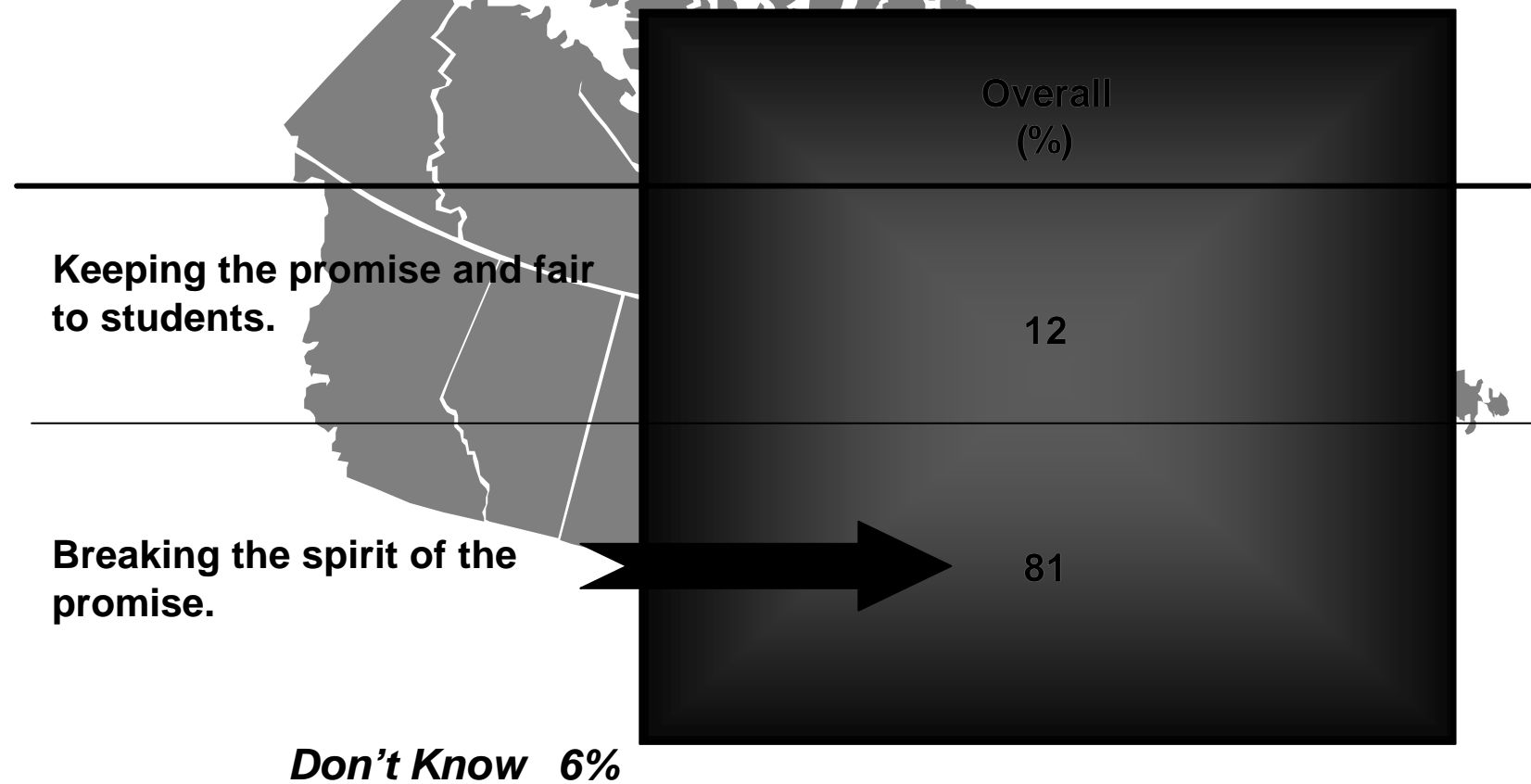
# Tuition Freeze: Public Support

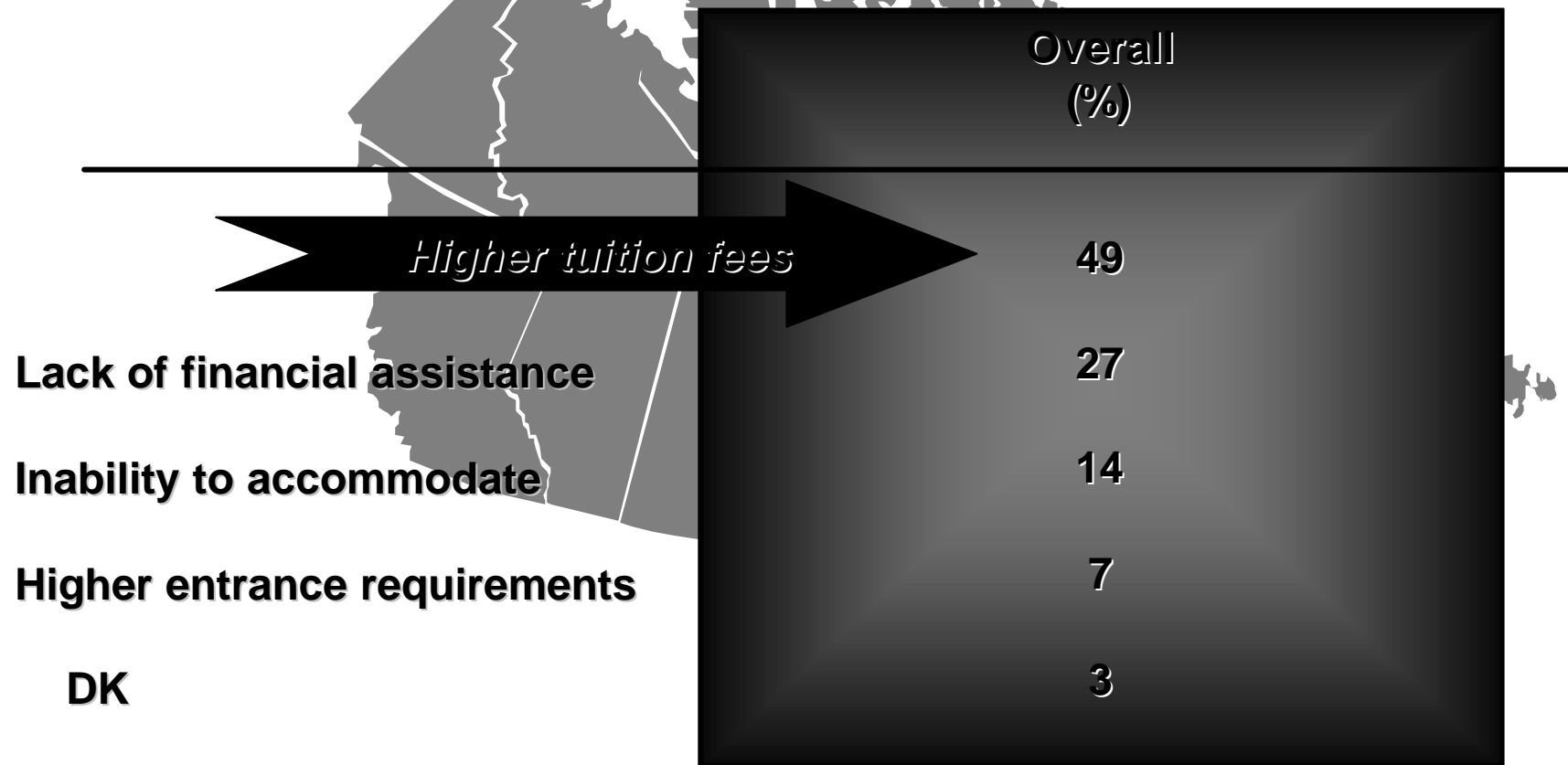

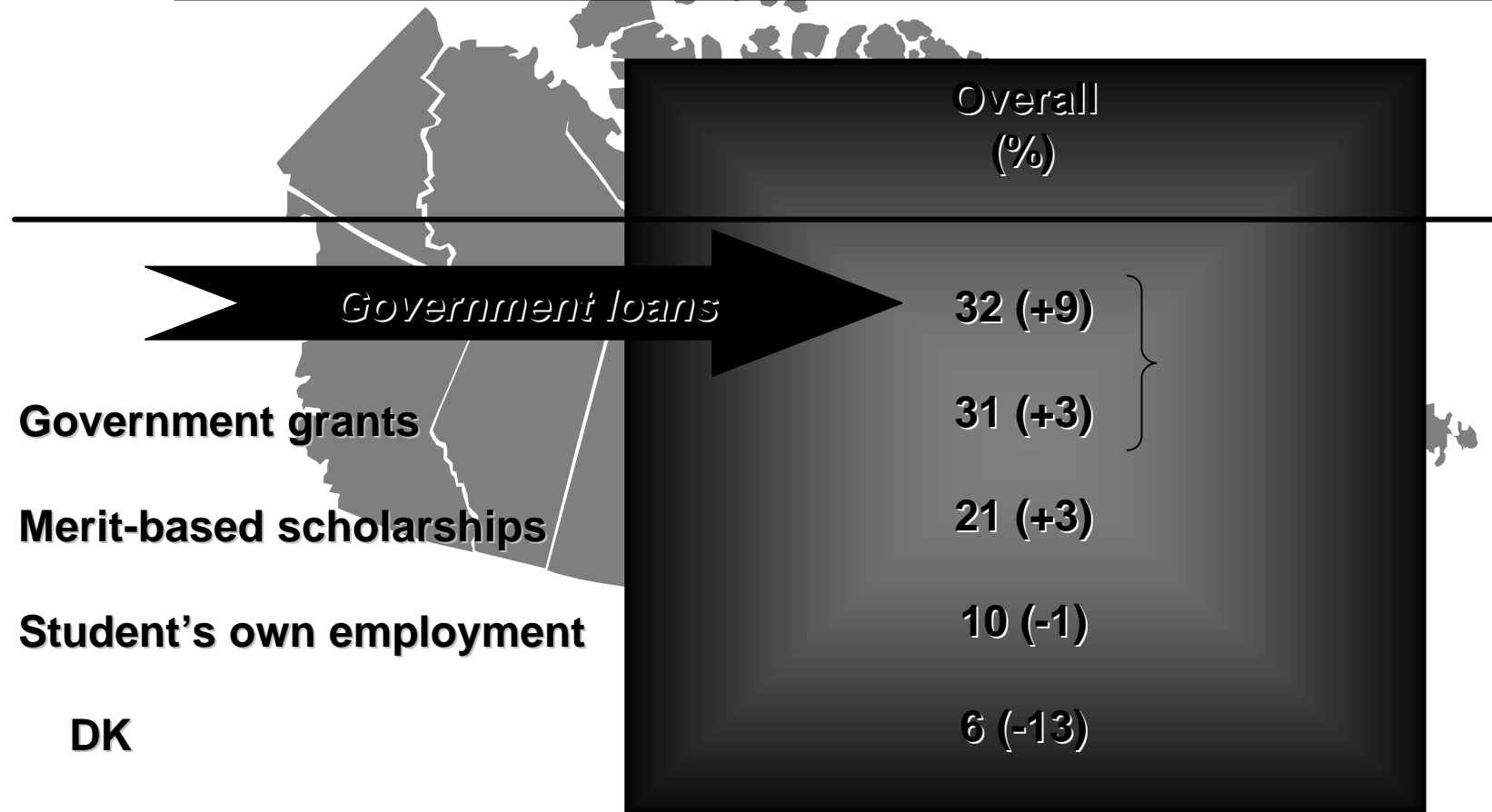
# Ability to Attend University: Reason for Concern

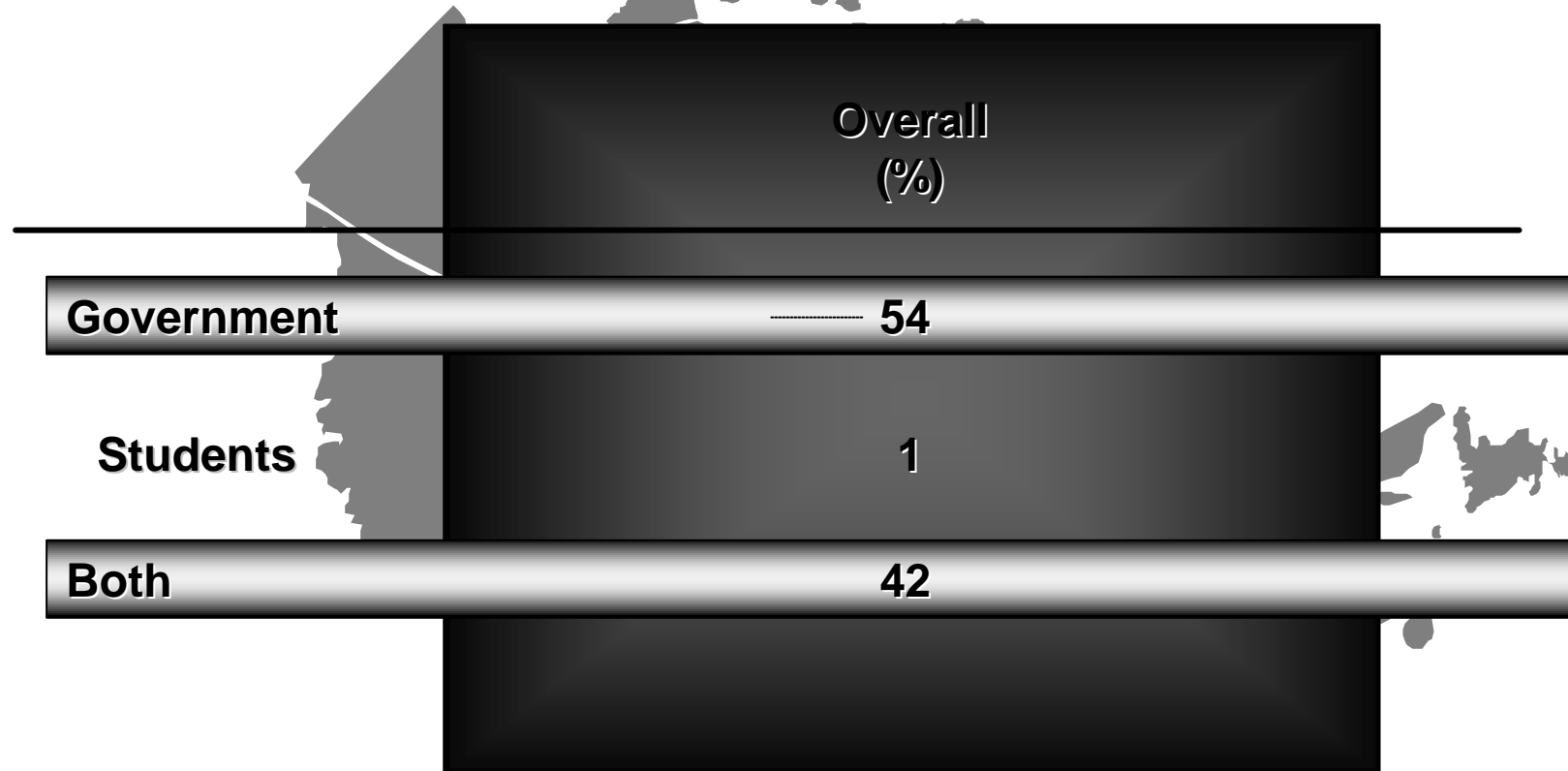

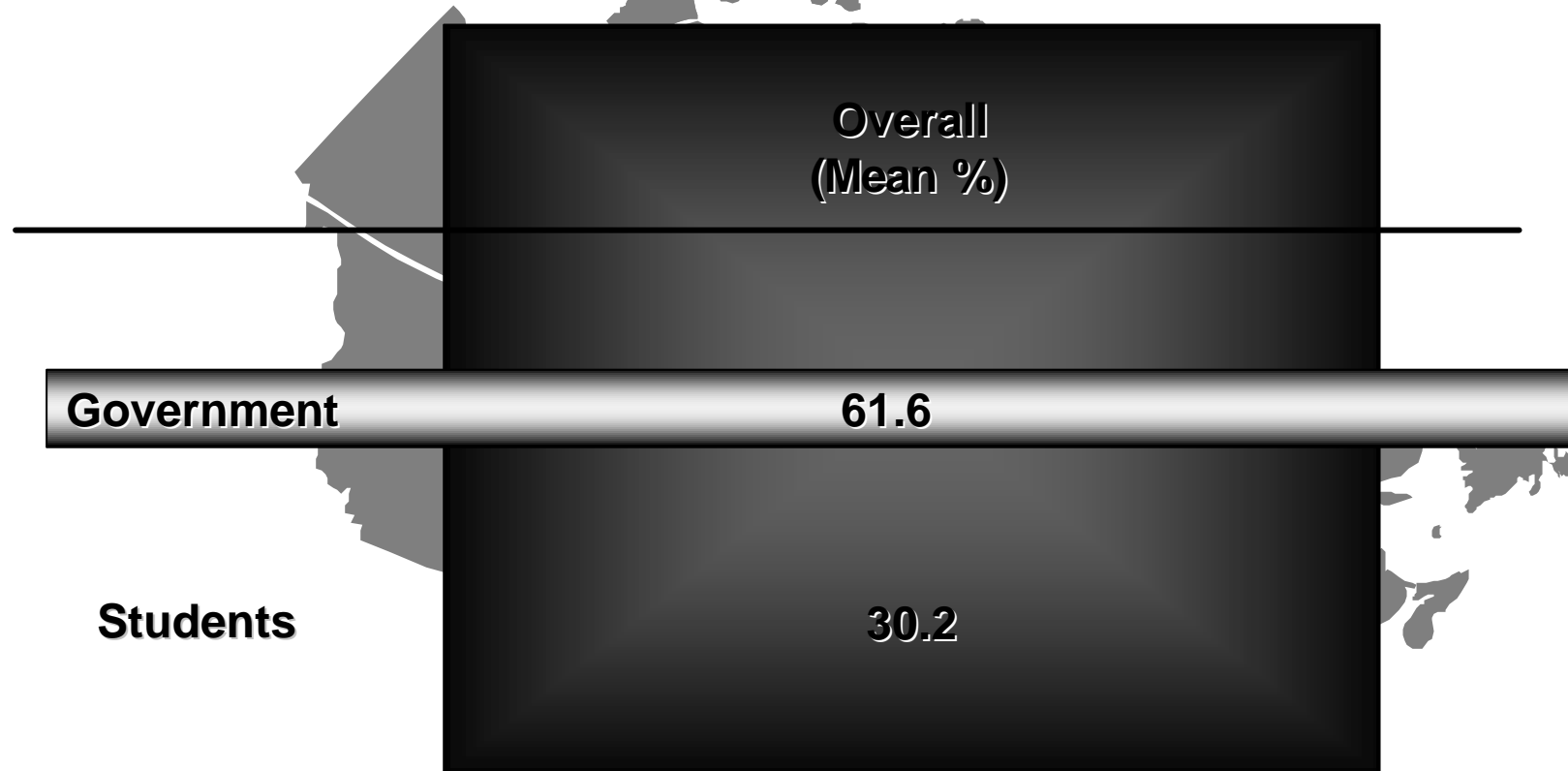
# Source of Additional Funding: Public Opinion

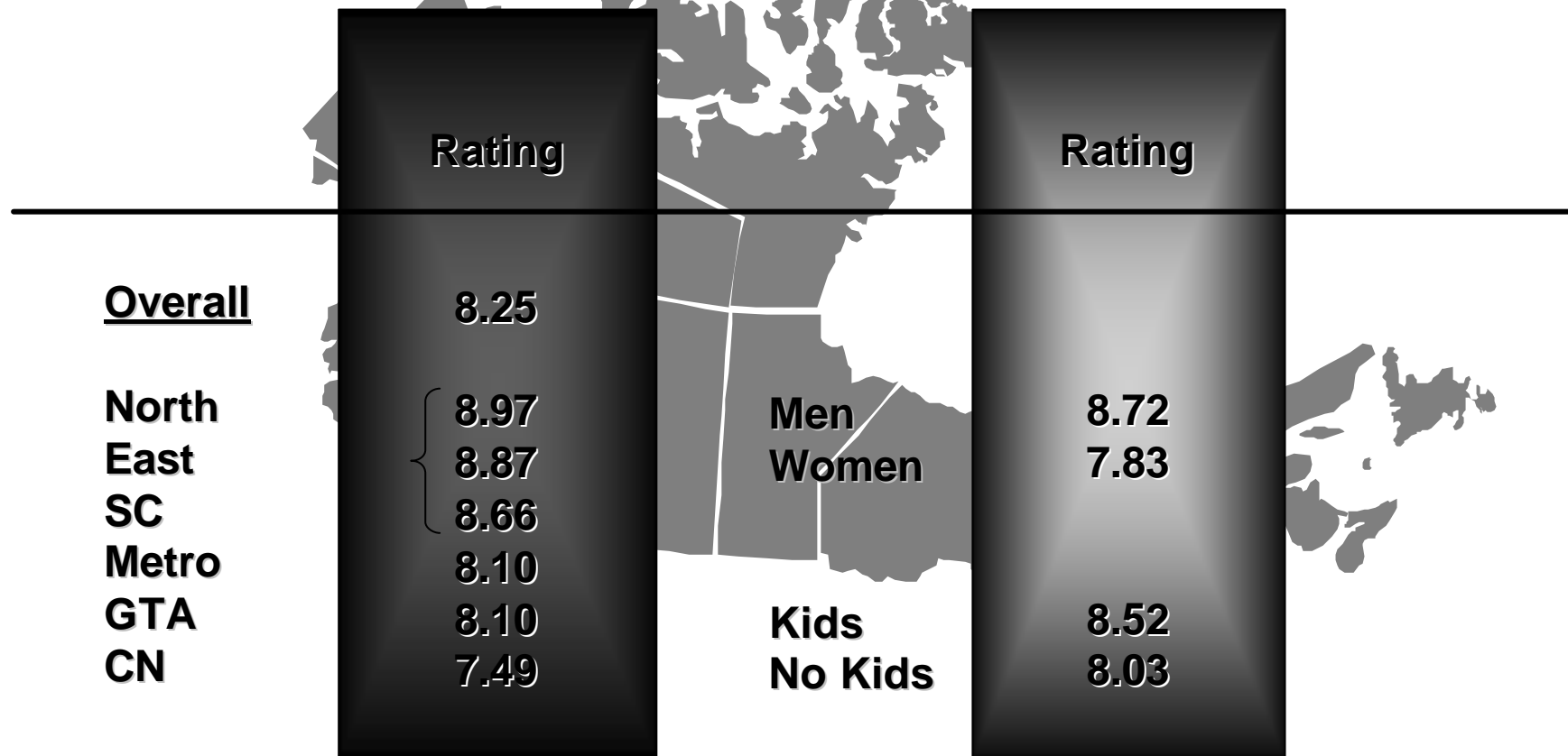
